Dr. Victoria Burke, Dr. Charles "Bo" Sanders and Dr. Fred Lopez (Infectious Diseases) recently updated their chapter on "Fever and rash in immunocompromised patients without HIV infection" for the UpToDate electronic textbook.



Dr. Stephanie N. Taylor (Infectious Diseases) was co-author of a paper nominated for a Charles C. Shepard Science Award. These awards recognize excellence in scientific achievement by CDC authors of outstanding scientific papers in the previous year and honor the memory of Charles C. Shepard, a renowned microbiologist. During the ceremony in October, the awards were described as the "CDC Scientific Community "Oscar Awards". In 2023, there were 2,977 CDC publications in 743 journals. Of the 2,799 publications, Dr. Taylor's paper was one of only 48 papers nominated in 5 categories. In the Prevention and Control Category, there were seven papers nominated. The 2023 Prevention and Control award was presented to authors of the landmark Mpox vaccine paper that was published in the New England Journal of Medicine. Although Dr. Taylor's paper did not win the award, it was a tremendous honor to be nominated.

Dr. Tat Yau (Infectious Diseases) was an organizer and co-host of a medical panel at HIV Stigma Summit in New Orleans. Sponsored by the Bounce to Zero organization, the Stigma Summit aimed to engage in dialogue around HIV stigma in the healthcare system, criminal justice system, and wider community. Dr. Yau and others presented "Smarter than Stigma: Scientific Advancements in HIV Treatment and their Impact on Stigma"



Dr. Jacques Nsuami (Infectious Diseases) published a book on the Second Amendment Right of American citizens under the Constitution of the United States. He became interested in the topic when he did some reading on the constitution and what he read did not match what he heard in the media. This is his review of the topic.



Dr. Tat Yau (Infectious Diseases) presented HIV 101 and Dr. Meredith Clement (Infectious Diseases) presented Ending the HIV Epidemic: Treatment and Prevention during our NOLA HIV Awareness Week at UMCNO. 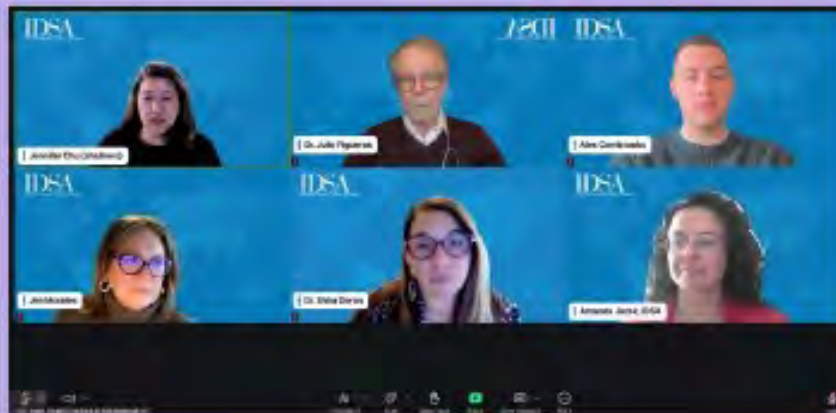

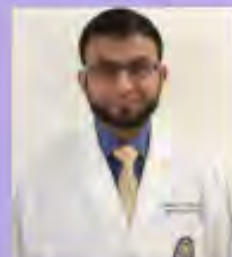
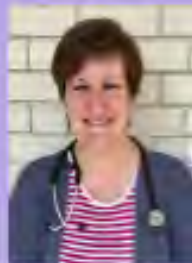

ACP MKSAP learners can unlock the CORE quizzes for a subspecialty after answering ACP MKSAP questions and meeting progress and proficiency thresholds. If learners meet the passing threshold for a CORE quiz, they will receive a CORE badge confirming their achievement, and after earning the designated number of badges, they can earn and print a CORE certificate for inclusion in their professional portfolio.
