TEACHING EXPERIENCE AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Curriculum Development/Implementation

Group Supervision of Supervision (2019 - 2022); 1 hour per week, year-long Developed and facilitate a clinical supervision training curriculum for the clinical psychology internship program, which provides interns with competency-based supervision of supervision. Each intern is paired with a supervisee (either a psychology practicum student or a psychiatry resident) for the duration of the training year and attends GSOS for 1-hour each week and is exposed to a range of supervision models/techniques via different methods – assigned readings from the supervision literature, didactics, role-plays, feedback on recorded supervision meetings, group discussions, quarterly evaluations and presentations. Starting in 2020, the curriculum was expanded to include postdoctoral psychology fellows providing supervision to less advanced trainees. Modifications were made in response to the pandemic to provide virtual group supervision of supervision to interns and fellows. In 2021, added two additional faculty facilitators and in collaboration with co-facilitators, modified curriculum to accommodate separate but concurrent fellow and intern meetings.

Dates: Summary:	2022-present The study objective is to test the long-term effects of a hospital-initiated intervention and examine how social contexts influence its adoption and sustained effects. This study will be conducted in collaboration with the Spirit of Charity Trauma Center at University Medical Center to implement a hospital- initiated intervention to reduce gun violence amongst older youth. The multi- faceted intervention includes motivational interviewing and firearm safety training through credible messengers as part of a broader risk reduction effort involving case management. We will employ a mixed methods approach, including a randomized controlled trial (RCT), to test the efficacy of the Motivational Interviewing (MI) intervention compared to treatment as usual (TAU) control condition. The hypothesis of this study is that this harm reduction intervention will be more effective in changing firearm-related behaviors and beliefs than the control condition at 3- and 6-months and reducing gun violence at 18-months post-baseline.

and verification criteria. For this study, a stepped-wedge cluster randomized clinical trial was conducted at 25 US level 1 trauma centers. The primary objective was to concurrently evaluate the implementation and effectiveness of a brief stepped collaborative care intervention targeting PTSD and comorbid conditions. The intervention consisted of evidence-based pharmacotherapy, psychotherapeutic elements, and proactive case management to assist patients as they transitioned from hospital to outpatient and community settings. The hypothesis of this study was that injured patients receiving a brief stepped collaborative care intervention would experience significant reductions in PTSD symptoms compared to control patients receiving enhanced usual care. It was also hypothesized that the intervention could effectively reduce depressive symptoms, alcohol use, and post-injury functional impairments.
