**R. Scott Daugherty, MD, FACS, FASCRS** Colon and Rectal Surgeon Baton Rouge General, Advanced Robotics of LA

Hometown: Lafayette, LA Medical School: LSU New Orleans Residency: General Surgery at LSU New Orleans Fellowship: Colon and Rectal Surgery at LSU Shreveport

I chose LSU because of the autonomy I saw during my medical school clerkship. I spent time at UMC (now UHC) in Lafayette and Earl K Long watching residents work tirelessly, but also noting their enjoyment and camaraderie.

I'm proud that LSU Surgery is continuing to train the surgical leaders of the future. LSU continues to match residents into very competitive fellowships at reputable institutions. I'm still involved with training the LSU residents- we have a chief resident that rotates with us at Baton Rouge General. The residents continue to impress me with their adaptability and ability to pick up new techniques- like robotic surgery. They come in ready to take on complex cases head on. I hope the department can continue training the surgical workforce for our home state.

Currently, I am preparing for the initial NAPRC (rectal cancer accreditation) site visit at Baton Rouge General in October. I also helped start a multidisciplinary Crohn's and Colitis clinic with gastroenterologist Dr. Casey Chapman. Casey and I recently took part in the Phase 3 ADMIRE CD trial, which evaluated the treatment of Crohn's anorectal fistula with expanded allogenic adipose-derived mesenchymal stem cell therapy. My current practice is with 5 other robotic surgeons, 4 of which are LSU Surgery alumni. Personally, my fellow LSU surgery alumni wife, Robyn Deranger Daugherty, started her own plastic surgery practice a year ago. We have four wonderful sons aged 8 and under. I enjoy coaching their football teams and attending their many other sporting events.

#### **Michael W. Cook, MD, FACS, FASMBS** Associate Professor of Clinical Surgery Division of General Surgery

Hometown: Memphis, TN Medical School: Univ. of Tennessee College of Medicine Residency: Ochsner Clinic Foundation of New Orleans Fellowship: Bariatric Surgery at Emory University

I joined LSU Surgery on April 1, 2018 (it was both April Fool's Day and Easter Sunday, make of that what you will!). I was recruited to help start the bariatric surgery program at UMCNO, where I am currently the Medical Director. Rather than being instructed to follow a prescribed set of requirements, I was empowered by LSU Surgery to follow my dreams. As a result, we added a sleep medicine program, obesity medicine program, bariatric fellowship, achieved MBSAQIP Comprehensive Center of Excellence recognition, and continue to grow and thrive!

I would love to see that same process expanded: Empowering capable faculty to grow professionally and expand their practices into world renowned centers. We have an amazing amount of ingenuity in this department, with a little more organization and support, we will be the envy of the Gulf South, if not the nation!

I have been very active with both the state and national chapter of ASMBS (American Society of Metabolic and Bariatric Surgeons). We just had the largest Louisiana state chapter meeting in its history last month with more than 100 attendees (3x last years turnout). I gave 2 talks at the meeting, one in the same session with Lieutenant Governor Billy Nunguesser. The meeting was held concurrently with the newly formed Louisiana Obesity Society (LOS), a group which I helped to start and am a founding Board Member of. There are a lot of exciting things happening in access to care in Louisiana and it is rewarding to be a part of that process. I was recently asked by the Louisiana Department of Health to be part of a working group to find a way for Medicaid to cover Anti-Obesity Medications (AOMs). We are hopeful that very soon we will be able to get a handle on the obesity epidemic and start to see the needle swing the other direction. Nationally I just took over as chair of the Insurance Committee for ASMBS and we are embarking on several ambitious projects that will have lasting impact (will have to update you on those in a year or two!).

Prior to joining LSU, I was very averse to participation in research. However, after working with so many creative and supporting faculty, I have caught the research bug again. One of my favorite research projects is accepted for publication in Obesity Surgery: We showed for the first time that dividing the hepatic branch of the vagus nerve in patients suffering from obesity see improvement in their HDL/Cholesterol ratio, theoretically reducing their cardiovascular risk. We are now starting a randomized controlled trial to confirm those results and hopefully be able to determine if those effects extend to hypertension and diabetes as well.

**Jason Reagor, MD** PGY-3, Vascular Surgery Resident


Hometown: Los Alamos, NM Medical School: University of New Mexico

#### **Wellness Corner**



### Mindfulness in Surgery

Explore how mindfulness can support well-being. When you experience stress, you can become caught up in it that to where you don't realize how the stress affects physical discomfort and connects to your emotional state. A body scan medication can help release physical tension—even the tension you don't realize you're experiencing—and reconnect you with your body. Mentally scanning yourself allows you to bring awareness to each part of your body—to notice any aches, pains, tension, or discomfort—and to get to know the pain and learn from it so you can manage it.

Practice a body scan using the audio, provided by Dr. Carter Lebares, MD, FACS, Assistant Professor of Surgery, University of California, San Francisco, who has developed a tailored MBI for surgeons called Enhanced Stress Resilience Training (ESRT) through the UCSF Center for Mindfulness in Surgery.
