



"After being in private practice for 25 years, it was an opportunity to give back to the institution that had given me so much in training and experience that prepared me for practice." He's proud that our department still produces residents that are capable of caring for surgical patients regardless of institution. He knows that our trainees are prepared to provide services to patients of large institutions or rural villages with a high level of skill. Dr. Morrison hopes that LSU Surgery continues to prepare these surgeons for a future of delivering quality surgical care.

Currently, Dr. Morrison is developing our outreach to help train medical students and surgical residents in Romania and Bulgaria in conjunction with the Society of Laparoscopic Surgeons. He's also busy reaching out to medical schools in Puerto Rico to teach medical students and increase their interest in surgery. Dr. Morrison is also working on a long term project that focuses on reentry from incarceration and providing assistance for incorporating them back into society as well as violence reduction strategies.

Wellness Corner



October 10 is World Mental Health Day

The overall objective of World Mental Health Day is to raise awareness of mental health issues around the world and to mobilize efforts in support of mental health. This day provides an opportunity for all stakeholders working on mental health issues to talk about their work, and what more needs to be done to make mental health care a reality for people worldwide. For surgeons, the importance of mental health may not be regularly discussed, but it should be:

Doctors are dying by suicide at higher rates than the general population. Somewhere between 300 to 400 physicians a year in the US take their own lives, **the equivalent of one medical school graduating class annually.** Surgeons have some of the highest known rates of suicide among physicians. Of 697 physician suicides reported to the CDC's national violent death reporting system between 2003 and 2017, 71 were surgeons.
